

Chairman's Report NOV 2012

The summer of 2012 again proved that Potton can step up to the plate when it comes to celebrations. It started with The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, marking the sixtieth anniversary of her accession to the throne. The Town Council was pleased to endorse the efforts of a Jubilee Events Committee which put on three days of events in June.

On behalf of the town, the Town Council wrote a message of congratulations to Her Majesty for which a letter of thanks was received in April. In recognition of her historic achievement the Council will be planting a row of trees along the Millennium Path in the Henry Smith Playing Field.

Also under consideration is the erection of a plaque on the Clock House but this has currently been stifled by the insistence of Central Bedfordshire Council that we must purchase a licence and apply for planning permission.

In this Olympic year we continued to fly the flags in the Market Square throughout the summer. At the end of August the Party On Potton team again put on a great bank holiday weekend programme which was hugely supported by the community. This bi-annual event which evolved from the ten day Millennium Celebrations held in a marquee at the Henry Smith Playing Fields continues to grow from strength to strength.

Also in this Olympic year it was pleasing to see some of the Town Plan recommendations coming to fruition, the highlights being the construction of the adult gym facility and the refurbishment of the children's play area in the Henry Smith Playing field. These facilities cater for the whole age range of the population and are being well used by residents. The Town Council has received a number of messages of appreciation. A formal opening ceremony was held on the 13th October, the ribbon being cut by Charles Belcher who is the Chairman of Potton Consolidated Charity without which support the project could not have proceeded.

As we now head into Autumn, thoughts go to Christmas lights. Some further upgrades to displays have been made this year to replace some of the old and tired ones. The big switch – on will be Friday 30th November so put the date in your diary and don't miss this popular and enjoyable evening.

COUNCILLOR PROFILE



In the hot seat this winter is Councillor Rex Whitfield

I have lived in Potton all my life, and the Whitfield family has been resident in the town for nearly 200 years. I spent about 14 years working as a geography teacher in Bedfordshire Upper Schools, and then became an insurance representative and financial adviser, working in Potton and the surrounding villages for nearly 16 years. I have now retired from this role and have returned to teaching, this time on a supply basis. I am also an organist at a number of local churches and the Potton Correspondent for the Biggleswade Chronicle.

Potton has grown significantly during my lifetime. I am interested in the town's history and like to think that I am aware of the problems it faces in the 21st Century. POTTON TOWN PLAN

The Council is hoping to have a new Town Plan Chairman in place very soon but in the meantime the Council wishes to thank Geoff Emery for all the work he has done in preparation of the plan and then in guiding the various committees to achieve many of the aspirations that were requested. There is still much to be done, but here is a short summary of some of the more recent achievements.

Shopping Committee

There was a successful Seasonal Market held in September and preparations are underway for the Christmas Market on Saturday 8th December. The Fairtrade Committee has been successful in obtaining Fairtrade status for the Town.

Sports & Leisure Committee

The Adult outside Gym is now in place at the Henry Smith Playing Fields and is very popular and well used, as is the new playground. New benches have been fitted at the Mill Lane sports field. Work has been ordered by the Town Council to bring the skate park up to standard and the Leisure Committee will be looking at long term plans for this facility. There is a need for more volunteers to help on the Sport and Leisure Committee if you can help please contact the Town Clerk?

Environment Group

The swift boxes are now in place on the Clock House in the Market Square and a planter has been placed on the Biggleswade Road, Station Road junction. Work to improve the water vole habitat has been agreed with the Ivel Valley Water Board.

Youth Group

The Youth Club is now up and running and proving very popular with the 12 -18 age group. Grants have been spent on equipment for use by the young people attending the group. The Youth Club meets in the Mill Lane Pavilion on a Thursday evening 7pm until 9.30pm.

SEASONAL FLOWERS AROUND THE TOWN

The floral displays around the town looked particularly good this year. The rain over the summer was good for something! The Council arranged for hanging baskets to be hung on the Clock House. The wine press in the Market Square and the four planters at the entrance to the Car Park were planted with summer bedding followed by winter flowers. A new planter is now in place on the Biggleswade Road junction and there are two small flower beds at the Sandy Road Cemetery near the War Memorial.

End who keep an eye on the Car Park planters and council staff for planting, watering "between the rain" and generally caring for the flowers and replacing broken or damaged plants.

If you notice vandalism of the flowers the Council would be grateful if you would report it to the Police immediately so that the culprits can be caught in the act and dealt with accordingly.

FEED YOUR CADDY, NOT YOUR BIN

Did you know the average family of four throws away £680 worth of uneaten food every year? Since the introduction of weekly food waste collections, Central Bedfordshire Council has been making good use of any food waste, collected in brown food caddies, and helping the environment too.

Using an anaerobic digester, basically a giant composter, food waste from the weekly collection has, to date, produced enough renewable energy to power more than a thousand homes for a year and prevented more than 13,000 tonnes of CO₂ entering the atmosphere. However with 60% of UK household food waste still ending up in landfill, residents can save money by making the most of their food.

Councillor Brian Spurr, Executive Member for Sustainable Communities Services at Central Bedfordshire Council said:

"Our residents are already doing a fantastic job in helping us keep food waste out of landfill but we can all still do more. There are many ways we can make our food go further – planning meals well, getting our portions right and being creative with leftovers. For any food that has to be thrown away, we encourage residents to use the brown caddies in the north of the area to separate all food waste from the normal refuse.

"Residents reducing the amount of food they throw away can save themselves money."

Over the coming weeks the Council's Waste Minimisation Officers will be out and about promoting the benefits of the weekly food waste collection service and addressing some of the concerns of using the caddy such as avoiding food smells, using either corn starch bags or newspaper to wrap the food waste and securing the caddy properly to avoid attracting vermin. They will also be offering some practical ideas on making food go further.

If you're new to the area or just need a reminder about the scheme, here's what leftover food you can put in your brown food waste caddy:

- Fruit and vegetables;
- Bread and pastries
- Dairy products;
- Meat and fish;
- Eggs including shells;
- Teabags and coffee grounds.

But please remember not to put in: large bones, liquids such as cooking oil, fruit juice or soup; any packaging, plastic bags or wrapping. If you prefer not to use compostable bags you can line your caddy with newspaper which will save even more waste and save money.

HALL HIRE AVAILABILITY AT THE COMMUNITY CENTRE AND THE PAVILION

There is a large 14 x 3.5 meter hall at the Community Centre in Brook End with a kitchen. There is also a carpeted upstairs hall 5 meters square with kitchen facilities. The upper hall is suited to smaller meetings and group events.

There are a number of vacant sessions during the day time and at weekends at the Community Centre, give Mrs Williamson a call to see if either of the halls would be suitable for your group or function. The centre is near to Potton Market Square for the bus route and shopping and a car park is very nearby.

The Pavilion at Mill Lane has a large 9 meter square hall and kitchen and there are facilities for people with disabilities. The floor may not be suitable for dance groups. This hall has some space for weekend functions.
