

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II 90th Birthday Beacon

Throughout history, signal beacons have been lit to commemorate and celebrate historical occasions. Beacons have been erected and lit to warn of the approach of the Spanish armada and for Queen Victoria's 60 year reign (at that time the longest reign of any British monarch.)

Since then, they have been used to mark the end of World War II on VE day 1945, the 70th anniversary of the event in 2015 and the bicentennial of the battle of Trafalgar also last year.

For our current Queen, beacons have been used to mark her silver, golden and diamond jubilees. Plans are now in hand to celebrate Her Majesty's 90th birthday on Thursday 21st April 2016 in the same manner.

The town council has resolved to have a beacon erected and lit in Potton to join in the national campaign. More information will be made available on our twitter account and our website.

DOGS ON PATROL - BY COUNCILLOR DENIS ELLISON

At the council offices, surgeries and meetings we as councillors are often challenged regarding the problems of dog fouling on our roads, pavements and parks. Dog issues and problems fall under the remit of our friends at Central Bedfordshire Council and they have a dog warden responsible for patrolling our roads, parks and pavements.

Unfortunately they only fund one and half people for all such activities across the entire area from Potton to Maldon, Berkhampstead to Woburn and from Shillington to Stotfold. Considering this, it's not surprising this person only appears infrequently and as a result of significant pressure from the town council.

Following up from recent escalation of tensions between dog walkers and park users at Mill Lane, an informal group was formed calling themselves Potton Responsible Dog Owners. This group has actively sought to influence the minority of irresponsible dog owners and even gone as far as clearing up the mess created by others, something they should be applauded for.

Over the Christmas holidays our daughter came to stay with her one year old Black Labrador Seren. Using the excuse of giving my daughter a break, I undertook dog walking duties early mornings and evenings. This new activity for me highlighted a friendly community of regular dog walkers who all seem to know each other and their respective pets, they almost all seemed extremely caring with their poobags and scoopers and were aware of the problems and indeed reputations which can so easily be spoiled by the uncaring few. They are also the eyes and ears of Potton, out and about our roads and paths and should be encouraged to see and report all issues, not just dog mess, but failed street lamps, potholes, fly tipping and many more.

Unfortunate the few will always be the focus of our attention and can easily create problems which will spill out across all dog users. Let's applaud those doing the right thing as much as we criticise those in the wrong.

POTTON TOWN COUNCIL BUDGET 2016-17



Again this has been a particularly difficult year for budget setting.

Potton Town Council on Tuesday 5th January 2016 decided to increase the charge for a band D property from £90.05 in 2015-16 to £95.99 in 2016-17, an increase of £5.94 a year, equivalent to 6.6%.

The charge is still less than \pounds 2.00 per week per band D household for all the functions, projects and services that Potton Town Council provides.

 \pounds 5.37 (5.9%) of the increase in Council Tax is for work to start on a Neighbourhood Plan for Potton. Potton Town Council has been advised by various sources and for various reasons that Potton needs a Neighbourhood Plan. Once a Neighbourhood Plan is in place the town can get more funding when new developments are built and have more say in future planning.

MUNKMAN CLOSE



Another Potton family has been recognised in the naming of a new development off Mill Lane.

Henry Munkman from Boston in Lincolnshire came to Potton in 1871 to take up an appointment with T.B. Kitchener, the agricultural engineer and contractor. He quickly became prominently involved in civic affairs and, recognising the growing importance of the local market gardening activity, established a successful produce agency, which was continued after his death by his son Harry. Another son, John, who followed in his father's calling as an engineer, became responsible for the operations of the town's sewage plant. Harry's son, Frank ran his own market gardening business as well as the produce agency and was for many years a member of the volunteer fire service brigade and, later, its Fire Officer.

His daughter Ann, was the most recent member to serve the community. Returning to live in Potton after teaching mathematics in the West Midlands, she was quickly elected to the Town Council, later becoming its Chairman, served as a Trustee of the Potton Consolidated Charity until forced by illness to retire and was Chairman of Governors of the Lower School. She died in 2009 after 20 years devoted service to the town of her birth she dearly loved.



Unfortunately, as far as we know there is now no-one of Munkman blood living in Potton.

POTTON FIRE STATION



Bedfordshire Fire and Rescue Service A life-saving defibrillator has been installed at Potton library as part a countywide initiative by Bedfordshire Fire and Rescue Service to assist people who suffer from cardiac arrest in the town. The defibrillator has been supplied in

partnership with Potton Town Council and is available for members of the public to use in the event of a heart attack prior to the arrival of the emergency services.

The defibrillator is stored in secured cabinet that is keycode-locked for security, with access given by the East of England Ambulance Service, when they receive a 999 call. Ambulance crews will also be dispatched to the scene. Training for local people on how to access and use the defibrillator is being organised by Potton on-call Firefighter Neville Mooney.

The defibrillator works by delivering an electrical current through the patient's chest which shocks their heart back into a normal rhythm allowing it to pump again.

You don't have to be medically trained to use the units as they come fitted with on-screen graphic illustrations and voice commands that guide the user step-by-step through the process, telling the user what to do and when. Also, its intelligent technology will only allow you to shock a heart if a rhythm cannot be detected.

Every year, many people suffer from cardiac arrest, and some will sadly die because they could not be treated quickly enough. Statistics show that, whilst CPR can be effective, swift access to defibrillators is a significant factor in helping more people to survive a heart attack.

Bedfordshire's Chief Fire Officer Paul Fuller said: "Whilst this initiative may seem to be outside of the usual remit of Fire and Rescue Service, I believe that more lives can be saved because of this joint project to install defibrillators where they are most needed. In the same way that you don't need to be a fire fighter to use a fire extinguisher, you don't need to be a paramedic to use a defibrillator. The important thing is that they help to save lives."

Bounce is a new indoor trampoline centre in Milton Keynes and the young people asked to go there following a successful summer programme. The trip was a success with ten young people bouncing their way round for an hour session. A couple of quotes from the young people include: 'It was great fun', 'it was good because we went on a trip we wanted to do' 'I had lots of fun, and got to learn new tricks such as a side 360' and 'It was a great trip, I can't wait for the next one'.

REPORT FROM COUNCILLOR DOREEN GURNEY

Homelessness in Central Bedfordshire 2015

- Demand for housing options advice and assistance increased by 16% over four years with a peak of 2,373 cases.
- Housing register applications increased by 8% over 3 years 1,337 applications were made up to 2014-2015 over 2,000 applications since new policy (all in housing needs)
- The cost of B&B accommodation more than doubled from £31,000 in 2011-12 to £71,000 in 2013-2014, significantly more 2014-2014/15 and increasing during 2016.
- The average length of stay B&B 14 days in 2013-2014, increased to 17 days to date (with independents)
- The largest priority group for homeless were lone females with dependent children at 40%

Independent Living Policy applies to schemes where the Council provides a care/ Support team on site such as Residential homes for / the disabled of any age / the elderly / & Learning difficulties of any age.

What is an allocation Policy

- Legal requirements Known as the Councils Allocations Scheme
- Fair and Transparent means to determine
 - a) Eligibility to join the Housing Register
 - b) who shall have priority for a property (letting & sales)
 - c) The process that shall be followed to 'make an offer'
- Means to ration a scarce resource
- Communication to manage customer expectations
