On Thursday 21st April this year beacons were lit the length and breadth of the country to celebrate the 90th birthday of Queen Elizabeth II. Our current monarch has broken all records. Since 9th. September 2015 the queen has been the longest reigning monarch and is also the oldest.

Potton Town Council arranged a ceremony to mark this remarkable achievement in line with similar celebrations all over the British Isles and abroad. A message from HRH Prince Charles was read out by the Queen's representative Ruth Bell MBE, Deputy Lieutenant of Bedfordshire, then a beacon was lit and The National Anthem was sung by those assembled.

## THE CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE - CLLR ANGUS MACDONALD



Hello and welcome to the Summer edition of the Potton Town Council quarterly newsletter.

I'll start by introducing myself. My name is Angus Macdonald and I've served on the town council now for six years. It is an honour and a privilege to be elected Chairman and to represent both the council and the town. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Councillor Peter Langridge for once again stepping into the

thank Councillor Peter Langridge for once again stepping into the hot seat these past two years, his second spell as Council Chairman. His experience and leadership have been invaluable to us all.

Since I moved to Potton in 2000 there have been many changes. We have expanded as a town and once again find ourselves growing to meet the ever increasing appetite for new housing in Central Bedfordshire. The new Biggleswade Road development has started in earnest and will no doubt cause some disruption over the coming months as work increases on the site. The development, which was opposed by the Town Council as it was at odds with our published Town Plan, will provide 151 new dwellings for the town, hopefully provide an opportunity for those who left or wish to stay in the area to find a home but more importantly, it will provide new residents with the opportunity to join our thriving community. I sincerely hope they grow to love and cherish the town as so many of us do.

Development will not stop there however. The second development approved by Central Bedfordshire Council in the last couple of years, the land to the South of Sutton Mill Road, has yet to start. There has also been a realisation by Central Bedfordshire Council that their housing plan for the county is inadequate and a recent appeal case has opened the door for developers to produce applications for further housing sites across the county.

This brings me nicely on to our Neighbourhood Plan. The Neighbourhood Plan aims to direct and guide the future development of the town and surrounding parish. It enables us as a community to have a far greater say in the expansion and development of our town in the years to come. A committee, chaired by Councillor John Hobbs, is currently working to produce a plan that meets the needs for Potton and is sympathetic to the character of the town. However this type of undertaking is best served by using a mix of skills and experience and I'd encourage anyone willing to volunteer to participate in the new Neighbourhood Plan to get in touch with the Town Clerk.

Finally I thought I would touch on the subject of communication. It can be difficult at times to ensure we, as a council, effectively communicate to the wider public. The nature of communication has rapidly changed over the past decade and we need to embrace all forms of communication to ensure that we continue to get our message across. This quarterly newsletter is just one of the ways this council does that. We also have notice boards across the town, we will soon be launching a newly updated website, we have our Twitter account (@PottonCouncil) and there is also the monthly Town Council meetings that we would welcome all members of the public to attend if they wish. However we can always improve and I would ask that you let us

know if there is any means of communication that is both practical for the council and useful to you that we do not currently use.

# Mr Peter Langridge, Chairman of the Town Council report

Good evening citizens of Potton. Welcome to the 2016 annual town meeting.

As has been the case for some years now the town council has been very busy on your behalf.

It would take too long to cover all that has transpired over the last year so I will try to give you a brief resume of it all.

First a mention that this year we lost a major figure from the town when Peter Hutchison OBE passed away. I do not think that should go by without an acknowledgment of his contribution to this town. To some of the newer residents it will mean little but the older residents will understand his commitment to the town and the football club.

To start, there has been a steady increase in the population which has brought its own set of circumstances and a resultant increase in workload. Because of the increase in the workload the council resolved to move to 2 full meetings a month and consider an increase in office space and an additional staff member to cover the full week.

A review was undertaken of the property that the town council is responsible for and its assets. The lease from CBC on the community centre requires regular maintenance and decoration, similarly the pavilion at Mill Lane leased from the Potton Charities. Due to the condition of the community centre the windows had to be replaced and we had the heating updated which necessitated repainting. The well-used skate park in HSPF is in desperate need of refurbishment. The enclosed churchyard at St. Mary's is our responsibility. It has been recently surveyed and needs a fair amount of work to make certain parts safe and a clean-up.

So, in efforts to keep the people informed on the activities and future plans of the town council we have held regular open house surgeries on a Saturday morning once a month in the library, and this will continue. The town council newsletter is produced quarterly and delivered to every household in Potton, and we have relaunched our council website. In addition to these the council office is open at various times for you to make contact or contact a councillor direct. At this time I would remind everyone that the current council was elected in May 2015 and the next election for full council will be in 2019. I would encourage anyone who has an interest in our town to consider standing at the next opportunity.

We have responded to the wishes of the town over the past year by:

- Fitting new gates at Mill Lane to stop the late night nuisance noise and damage.
- Setting up a responsible dog owners committee to allow dog walkers and sports to share the facilities.

- Removed the dangerous low branch in HSPF.
- Used the tree branch to create some modern art as a reminder.

We also considered CCTV for parts of the town and a memorial garden to commemorate those who have fallen in defence of our country.

The town council has supported the Christmas Lights, the Hall for All and fitted a defibrillator on the library's wall for the benefit of all in need.

Later this year will be the Party on Potton during the August bank weekend and on 21st. April we will be lighting a beacon to celebrate the queen's 90th. birthday along with many other parishes around the country.

As a council we have submitted a bid to CBC for match funding under the Market Town regeneration Fund to revitalise the town and are currently awaiting a response to our bid.

The bad news is (and there is always bad news) we are in the 21st. Century and we all have to be self-sustaining.

During the year we have had both internal and independent audits of our finances and proved to be sound and solvent. However to maintain our current situation regarding our responsibilities, without looking to the future, and projects we would like to undertake on your behalf, costs us more each year. With ever increasing costs of obligatory inspections on the play equipment and outdoor gym, replacing parts of the skate park and any future projects our only way to raise funds is through our precept for the council tax. Unfortunately we have had to increase this again this year with no help from CBC.

A snapshot of our situation could be shown in the grass cutting around the town. We pay a contractor to cut the road verges on behalf of CBC. CBC only pay the town council approximately 20% of the costs and we have to fund the rest. You could say then don't cut the verges but when they are overgrown and unsightly who do you think is blamed? Cut them less often you say and when they are cut the resultant long cuttings are all over the road. Refer to previous comment.

To finish I would just like to say thank you to all those who have supported me during my time as chairman over the past year.

Councillors who have taken on roles and projects for the town, the clerk and his staff. So in conclusion I could not finish without saying a big thank you to the Potton Charities for their help and support throughout the year. Without that we would be in far worse situation.

# Potton Lower School Clean for the Queen

Year four pupils at Potton Lower School have worked with their town council to join the 'Keep Britain Tidy' campaign to 'Clean for the Queen'. This is an event to commemorate the Queen's 90th birthday, encouraging volunteers of all ages, across the country, to pick up litter in their local community. Potton Town Council supported the children by supplying them with litter grabbers and rubbish sacks, and the children set out to the local recreation ground and park in the town, last Wednesday 20th April.



They were able to collect 7 bags of rubbish in under an hour, bringing Potton towns total to 47 bags of rubbish collected for this event.

The school's Science Coordinator, Kate Sefton said, "We were delighted with the children's enthusiasm to take part in this event. As a school we hold 'Green Flag Status' with Eco Schools England, and activities like this have helped us with our application for renewal of the award in June. The Year 4 children have also been learning about 'global conservation' and 'habitats', so it has been wonderful for them to take their learning outside of the classroom and have a really positive impact in their local community."

## **CLEAN FOR THE QUEEN - BY CAROL LEGGATT**



A successful "Clean for the Queen" litter pick was held in Potton over the weekend of 11th - 13th March 2016. In excess of 40 bags of rubbish were collected from various areas around the

town by volunteers who willingly gave up their time. Those taking part were individual residents and families in addition to local groups including the Jubilee Project, Girl Guides and both Pre-schools. The Lower School will be continuing the exercise after Easter.

A large part of the town was cleared, extending out to Biggleswade Road, Mill Lane, Everton Road, Hatley Road and Bury Hill. By far the worst area was Bury Hill and Sutton Road where many bags of rubbish were collected from the hedgerows, some of which was not very savoury. It has been suggested to the Town Council that it would be beneficial to install a rubbish bin and a dog waste bin at the junction of Bury Hill and Sutton Road as this is a popular route with walkers. This is under consideration.

Another hot spot was the Henry Smith Playing Field. This area was cleared on all three days. Particularly bad was alongside Potton Brook in amongst the brambles where many discarded cans and bottles were collected together with lots of empty bread wrappers. On the other side of the field in the end of the Horsebrook there are numerous bottles which have over spilled from the bottle bank. These will need to be cleared by the appropriate authority. Between the two bridges along the Church Causeway the composting leaf mould was cleared from the path effectively doubling its width. This in itself was a morning's work for two people.

In recognition of their efforts the volunteers were invited for tea and cakes after the event at the Community Centre, hosted by the Chairman and Members of the Town Council.

In view of the success of this project and the positive response from townsfolk, a further litter pick is being considered perhaps in the autumn.







# Report number I from Cllr Adam Zerny

<u>East West Rail confirms Bedford-Sandy-Cambridge 'corridor'</u> - Readers of my newsletter will remember that last summer, I mentioned how East West Rail had narrowed down their options for the Bedford-Cambridge section of the new rail line down to two 'corridors', via Hitchin or Sandy.

Well it seems Network Rail have now decided the preferred 'corridor' will be via Sandy.

At this stage they aren't giving any indication of what route this will take but we should know more about how they intend to plan this, in the next couple of months.

The next announcement is expected in May when they will provide all the supporting evidence of the 'business case' of the Sandy 'corridor'. This may shed some light on where the route may go as it will explain how they expect it to be commercially viable. Of course this viability will be closely connected to the communities it will serve.

Work will then begin on route options and within the next year, we should know what these options are.

#### **REPORT NUMBER 2 FROM CLLR ADAM ZERNY**

<u>Development in our area</u> - Watch out! The roving eyes of our ever-benevolent local authority are casting around for new land.

You'll recall that in the last two years Central Bedfordshire Council have had to withdraw a Gypsy/Traveller site allocation plan (after concerns raised by an Independent Inspector) and a Local Development Plan (after failing to demonstrate they'd consulted with neighbouring local authorities and then losing a costly appeal) so you could be forgiven for questioning their judgement and competence. Undeterred, they are currently seeking new land for housing developments and Gypsy/Traveller sites.

The council's Planning Department have been on tenterhooks for the last couple of months waiting for the result of an important planning appeal. The appeal related to the construction of 93 houses near Henlow. The council had turned it down and the developers took them to appeal. The appeal was dismissed because "character and appearance, outweighs the environmental, social and economic advantages of the scheme" but, more importantly, the appeal's inspector said Central Beds Council don't currently have an adequate five year supply of housing. This means they are more likely to see appeals for big planning decisions they run down and as a result are very keen to top-up their supply of housing.

So, as a result they've launched an appeal for new housing estates of 500 houses or more and new traveller sites. As you are probably aware, the council have already put in a planning application for a traveller site on a plot of land just outside Dunton. The council describe this land as owned by 'Central Bedfordshire Council' although you and I would probably feel this best described as 'public land'. The council see nothing wrong, ethically, with putting in their own planning application and ruling on it themselves via the Development Management Committee.

In fact, I actually worked it out after the last Big Weekend in 2014 and over a typical two year POP committee timespan the average committee member would clock-up 425 hours of service to POP, including committee meetings, markets, bar hire events and the Big Weekend itself but this doesn't include specialised activities such as buying bar stock/ordering food, running general errands, banking, marketing/advertising activities, working on the programme/ schedule and writing minutes/agendas for example. That's a minimum of almost 57 days of full-time employed work across the two year lifetime of a committee member...that we give freely for the love of Potton!

In addition, there are a whole host of other volunteer helpers who make themselves available to assist with fund-raising and during the course of the event itself. If you would like to volunteer to help us (e.g. litter picking, hovering the marquee, serving teas and coffees, manning the BBQ, working the bar, marshalling etc.) then please contact us by email: committee@partyonpotton.org.uk.
