Message from Rt Hon Alistair Burt MP for NE Bedfordshire



I have had the honour of representing NE Bedfordshire in Parliament since 2001. It is a large and widespread constituency, from Arlesey and Stotfold in the south, Potton and Wrestlingworth in the East, up to Podington on the Northants border, and including my largest two towns, Biggleswade and Sandy.

In such a large area, communications are vital, as an MP simply cannot be everywhere all the time. I have a constituency office and case worker in Biggleswade, but work out of Westminster also with a small team of assistants, all of whom are very experienced. We try to be very available, and attach details of this at the end of this note.

Constituents are interested in almost everything that touches an MP's life, from the immediate issues which affect them personally - which takes up most of an MP's 'surgery' time, to local and regional matters, and of course national or international issues on which you want your voice heard. My role as a Minister in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and at International Development attracts your attention, and fills much of my time also, so balancing things is not always easy.

Letters and emails run at a high level, and I try to respond to individual concerns and campaigns as swiftly as I can. There are many more campaign letters then when I first began, so my website or Facebook page will usually carry generic answers to campaigns, which informs more people as a consequence.

I'm keen to be personally available for larger meetings or events when an issue is of significant interest. I have been twice to Potton recently for public meetings on planning and sustainability, to explain how I work, on behalf of constituents, with those agencies which have responsibilities for decisions, from health to planning. I am very aware of the pressure on housing and local communities, and the difficult balance to be kept to ensure local infrastructure of all sorts keeps a sustainable pace with growth, and that people do not feel 'overrun' with planning applications.

As well as all the work, there are other reasons for me to get out and about locally, and it's high time I fitted in Potton United to the list of non-league football teams I watch regularly round here. See you there!

CBC bills you Council Tax every year and in return the Council is responsible for maintaining the roads, taking the rubbish away, supporting schools' administration, some leisure and sport, some adult social care and Children's Services, administering benefits and of course Planning including deciding where new houses go.

The town council is the first tier of local government. There are fifteen Town Councillors who are elected every four years to represent the interests of the community.

Potton Town Council meets on the first Tuesday of the month (except during August). The meetings are usually held following a Planning Committee meeting which starts at **7pm** in **The Community Centre, Brook End**.

The public is welcome to attend any meeting and there is a public forum at each town council meeting giving the opportunity to address the Council. The town council staff are always happy to advise or refer complaints to the correct authorities, but a direct complaint will afford a faster response.

Potton Community Centre

The Community Centre is situated in Brook End with parking facilities at the nearby Brook End car park. The building was converted from the old Potton Fire Station

The Town Council has a small office in the building and there is a recently decorated hall for hire, approximately 14 x 5 metres with a separate kitchen equipped with crockery, fridge, cooker, urn and kettles. There is a piano, portable tables





and 60 chairs so it is suitable for private parties, meetings and exhibitions. The hall is currently used for yoga, choir groups and meetings. The hall can be hired by private individuals, community groups and commercial hirers.

Public Toilets

Potton Town Council provides public toilets in **Brook End, Potton SG19 2QS** and these are open Monday to Saturday from **7am to 4pm**. The town council is responsible for the maintenance and cleaning of the facilities.

The public conveniences are cleaned daily. The facilities include a disabled toilet which can be accessed with a Radar toilet key.

Potton's Defibrillators

Locations: Outside of Potton Library, Market Square, Potton SG19 2NP and outside of Potton Middle School, Mill Lane, Potton SG19 2PG

Availability: The defibrillator is available for the public twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. You must **dial 999 to obtain a code** to access the defibrillator



The defibrillator is an automated external defibrillator (AED) which is a portable electronic device. An automated external defibrillator is used in cases of life threatening cardiac arrhythmias which lead to cardiac arrest. Instructions are provided by the AED during usage.



Allotments

Potton Town Council manages an allotment site at Everton Road, Potton. There are 44 full size allotment plots which are all currently tenanted and a waiting list is in operation.

Allotment holders are not allowed to keep livestock, but a small shed is permitted with permission.

There is a thriving allotment community with tenants of all ages helping and advising each other. The council has provided a water supply and a notice board. Allotment holders often share young plants and seeds and help themselves to a free supply of horse manure.

The council resolved that tenants must be resident in Potton. If you wish to add your name to the waiting list please contact the Town Clerk 01767 260086 or email pottoncouncil@btconnect.com and leave your name, address and a contact telephone number.




Cemetery and Churchyard

The town council owns and manages Potton Cemetery on Sandy Road. The cemetery is laid to lawn and space is now limited. However, we are still able to offer burials and interment of ashes.











Mill Lane Recreation Ground

The town council leases and maintains a playground, open space and pavilion.

The playground has various pieces of play equipment. The open space is used for many different recreational uses.





The pavilion is available to hire being approximately 9 x 9 metres with chairs and portable tables, a separate kitchen with serving hatch equipped with crockery, fridge, cooker and kettle.

Henry Smith Playing Fields

Henry Smith Playing Fields were presented to Potton in 1934 by Miss L E Smith. The field to the north of the Sluice is a large meadow with Potton Brook to its eastern edge and Horse Brook to its western edge. The area to the south of the Sluice has an outdoor gym, skatepark, play area and a free public car park.

Water Vole Habitat

Although water vole populations are now scarce, the Wildlife Trust has confirmed that they are present near Potton Brook. The Potton Environment Group works to improve this habitat to sustain its suitability for water voles and encourage their population on this site. The Sluice is currently the area most used by the water voles as the tall wetland vegetation provides a good source of food and cover from predators.

Spread Your Wings Sculpture

This sculpture was unveiled in 2008 having been gifted to Potton by local artist, sculptor and journeyman, Paul Pibworth. It is fabricated from sheet stainless steel with a hollow structure, which is in-filled with concrete and takes the form of a swallow in flight.

opened in July 2017, the new concrete skatepark is a replacement


for the old metal structure, which was closed in May 2017. Potton Consolidated Charity and Sport England gave significant contributions towards the cost of the new skatepark.

The play area has equipment suitable for younger and older children, most of which was installed during 2012 with funding from Potton Consolidated Charity.










Frederick William
Jakes MBE
Freeman of Potton



Frederick William Jakes, better known to all as Eric, was a true Pottonian, who did much to shape and mould the future of Potton and worked tirelessly for the good of the town and community throughout his adult life.

Born on 8 May 1928 in Horslow Street, Potton, Eric attended St Mary's Church from a very early age, eventually becoming a church warden, a position he held for 36 years. When he retired from this position, to show their gratitude for his service, he was awarded the title of Church Warden Emeritus.

Eric was elected on to Potton Parish Council at the age of 27. He served as a town councillor, a councillor on the old Biggleswade Rural District Council and subsequently on Mid-Beds District Council, forerunners of the current Central Bedfordshire Council and held the position of chairman during his tenure for all these authorities.

Separate to his civic duties, Eric was also a Governor of Burgoyne (now Potton) Middle School for over 30 years, serving as chairman for much of the time. For many years he was a member of Potton Consolidated Charity, serving again as chairman until ill health forced his retirement. During his spare time, he was a member of the Potton History Society.

Eric had been a Parish and Town Councillor for 59 years when he retired in June 2014. As a mark of respect for his tireless work, Potton Town Council honoured Eric with the esteemed title of Freeman of Potton at a special meeting on 2 September 2014, granting him freedom of the town.

Frederick (Eric) William Jakes MBE, Freeman of Potton, passed away on 12 December 2016 at 7.55 pm aged 88 and Potton gave him a fond farewell at his funeral held on Friday January 6, 2017. Every year the bells of St Mary's Church ring on 8 May to celebrate his birthday.


To mark the first anniversary of Eric's passing, the Town Council commissioned a plaque as an initial memory to the extraordinary contribution he made to the town. This was affixed to a bench in the Market Square so that residents will remember him. The unveiling of the plaque was held on 8 May 2017.

Potton Consolidated Charity

A Potton based charity. The objects of the charity are:

- the relief of persons resident in the area of benefit who are in need, hardship or distress;
- the advancement of education of children and adults under the age of 25 resident in the area of benefit;
- to further the religious and other charitable work of the Church of England in the area of benefit; and
- the general benefit of the inhabitants of the area of benefit in such charitable ways as the trustees think fit.





The Potton History Society keep an archive of photographs and documents that illustrate times past and present in the town. Potton's recorded history stretches back over a millennium. The first recorded mention of 'Potune' is in a grant of land to Ramsey Abbey by the Saxon Aelfhelm. In the Domesday book in 1086 'Potone had 18 villagers, 2 freemen, 13 smallholders and 3 serfs'. This would suggest a total population of around 100.

A market was granted by King William II in 1094 which could have been held in the churchyard before moving to its present site in the early 13th century. This was to develop into one of the most important in Bedfordshire by the 18th century. It declined in Victorian times until only a Horse Fair was left in the 1930s.


In 1237 Potton was split by inheritance into four manors: Potton Rectoria, Potton Burdetts, Potton Regis and Potton Much Manured. These four manors were finally recombined by the Burgoyne family between 1544 and 1637 by progressive purchase. They passed via the Byng family to the Whitbreads of Southill who sold off their estate holdings in 1917.

The prosperity of Potton as a market town is reflected in its oldest houses on the south side of the Market Square and in Sun Street. These have timber frames which may have originated in late medieval or early Tudor times.

The Great Fire of Potton in **1783**, which one report states started in a clover stack of



Mr Edwards in a field at the present Spencer Close, destroyed King Street and around half of the Market Square as well as some of the Brook Street area. It was reputed to have burnt for a day and caused over £25,000 of damage. Over £6,000 was collected to help those who had suffered most. The rebuilding of this part of Potton has provided a rich inheritance of Georgian buildings.



The railway era began in **1857** when the Shannon steam engine started its journey between Sandy and Potton. The original engine shed still exists on private land behind Biggleswade Road. Potton railway station opened on the Bedford to Cambridge railway a few years later on a new site on Sandy Road. The Shannon was built for the Potton to Sandy



Railway and still survives today at the Didcot Railway Centre having worked on the Wantage Tramway.




The last train left Potton station on 30th December 1967. The railway era contributed to the decline of Potton market but enabled the development of market gardening by providing easy access to London markets.

The Board Schools opened in purpose built buildings in **1876**, bringing Potton into the new era of National education for all. At this time there were around 2000 Pottonians. The schools went through a number of organisational changes until they were replaced by the Everton Road Schools and were demolished in **1982**.

A series of minor fires prompted the building of a fire station in **1887** and the formation of a Volunteer Fire Brigade. This building is now the Community Centre and Town Council Offices in Brook End.

Over 30 pubs and inns as well as two breweries were listed in **1903** giving 2,033 Pottonians plenty of choice for drinking! Mr Richardson had a Mineral Water Factory in Sun Street while the Potton Brewery Company operated from premises opposite the current Tesco store in King Street.

A Victorian Manor house was built next to the site of an older house at the bottom of King Street in the 1860s.



This had no connection with the four historic manors of Potton which were land holdings rather than buildings. The ballroom hosted many parties but became a laboratory during the war years. It was demolished in the early **1980s**.

Eva Pokorova and Otto von Smekal came to the Manor House during the last war and hoped to set up a car factory in Potton. Cars from Potton Manor were later removed to the National Motor Museum. The Potton Car has been purchased by the History Society and can be seen from time to time at local shows.

Sir Malcolm Stewart, the last Lord of the Manor, lived at the nearby Sandy Lodge and provided land for unemployed men in the first Land Settlement Association holding in **1935** at Potton. This provided land and a house for a family to work together. Many of the original settlers were unemployed miners from Durham who often found the agricultural life unsuited to their skills and their was a high turnover before the War years provided stability with families more used to the land. The LSA was wound up in the early 1980s due to government cut backs and EEC competition.

The old Market Square Shambles building was replaced by the present Clock House in **1956** for a town whose population was still just over 2,000.





The Tanyard closed in 1970 in a town whose population had risen to 3,026 with many more commuting rather than working locally. It had provided local employment in producing leather and parchment.

A gradual infilling of land in Potton helped it to grow and enable local services to continue. By the 2011 census the town had steadily grown to 4,870. The aerial photograph shows the revamped Market Square designed to enable more locals to safely use its facilities.



Potton has developed more small businesses to take the place of larger employers. It has a wide range of social groups, including thriving sports and music groups and has strong Community organisations which put on events such as the annual Potton Show and the biennial Party on Potton.

Potton has a unique history which is still being written today and which the archives of the history society will continue to record for future generations of Pottonians.

Potton Town Council Crest



The election for the first Potton Parish Council took place on the 17th December 1894 after the introduction of the Parish Councils Act 1894. This Act removed all non-ecclesiastical functions from church parish councils and passed them to newly-established local elected bodies, which became known as 'parish councils'.

The Local Government Act 1972 entirely restructured local government within England and Wales, and it provides the legal foundation for the existence of town and parish councils.

Potton Town Council in 1994 erected a crest on

the Clock House to commemorate 100 years of Potton Town and Parish Council.

These days, as a town council, there are fifteen elected councillors who continue the unbroken tradition of working for the good of the community. A town councillor is unpaid and give their time for free to the community on a voluntary basis.

As the first tier of local government, it is closest to the people it represents.





The present Clock House stands on the site of an older building known as the Potton Shambles. The word 'Shambles' means 'folding stalls for the sale of goods'. On the south side of the market square there was a row of wooden booths with a tiled roof where wooden shutters could be let down and used as counters.

Complaints were made by the butchers who rented the 'leaking stalls' so renovations were put in hand by Lord of the Manor, Samuel Whitbread, in 1797 resulting in the buildings which survived into the 20th Century.

"I hope that you will have orders to have the Shambles repaired, or some built. for the butchers are very discontented at paving one shilling and eighteen pence each and are oblideged to sit in the wett when they can have an open stall for a

groat, which I suspect they will have unless they are done very soon. If the shops are to be tahen down I beg you will let me know that I may give the Tennents timely notice to leave them"

The market in corn, one of the largest in Bedfordshire, diminished in importance after the Great Fire of Potton in 1783. Victorian Trade Directories chart the decline. probably brought about by transport changes in the

Turnpike and Railway era's and by cheap imports from America. At the end of the 19th century stalls were opened every Saturday by grocers, butchers and other traders but this soon declined in the early 20th Century leaving only the annual Horse fair to survive into the 1930s.

Frederick William Jakes MBE 'Eric' Freeman of Potton



The clock had been a replacement for an older one and had been supplied by John Bennett of Cheapside in London in 1877. A new bell was fitted in 1900 by John Warner & Son of London and was 21 inches in diameter with a note of A flat. This is still the bell which rings out over

the Square. Local clockmaker Thomas Judge was paid £38 in the same year to 'repair, clean and refix the town clock and to provide and fix two transparent (four foot) diameter dials. The Clock House is home to Potton Library which celebrated its 60th birthday in 2016.

The Shambles had fallen into disrepair in the hard times of the 1930s. A campaign for their restoration was cut short by the Second World War. The old buildings were no longer needed as Potton now had no market and it was decided to demolish them and provide Potton with a modern Library. The Clock House was built by Bull & Sons of Sandy in the Georgian style of the former building. It was officially opened on 23rd July 1956 by the Chairman of Bedfordshire County Council, Sir Frederick Mander.

The clock, illuminated dials and bell were taken from the old Shambles and reused in the present Clock House.






The ornamental pole was erected to celebrate the victory at the battle of Waterloo. There is no known record of when it was taken down.

Potton History Society Community Archives

Potton has one of the most active local history societies in Bedfordshire. After forty years of collecting material new items keep turning up. Photographs were taken, kept and then too often lost, but some survived. The image below found its way to us in May 2017...over a century after it was taken! Can you spot the changes?



Now it has a home with the Potton History Society, which was was formed in 1977. The collection had been started by founding secretary Patricia Yates who kept a small personal archive in her Royston Street bungalow including her distinctive photographic albums.

The collection outgrew the bungalow and moved into two small adjacent rooms in out-buildings which were maintained by the Society. Further space was needed and the offer of disused stable space off Biggleswade Road was accepted and the collection was moved on April 30th 1994. 'The Stables' provided a three bay area with linking corridor to house the growing 'Potton Collection' of photographs, scrapbooks, audio & video tapes, documents, paintings. objects, society equipment and display boards.

It also provided a working area for archiving work which now feeds the society web site and Facebook page and provides material for exhibitions and displays. The Society was able to move its collection in the autumn of 2017 to a new purpose built annex to the Mill Road Pavilion. It has been able to do this due to the generosity of Potton Charities and support from the William Delafield and Foyle Foundations as well as help from Potton Town Council.

Story in Stone - The Legacy Continues

As you will have noticed, Potton Library will never be quite the same again externally. Having been adorned with its own mosaic showing four aspects of the town's history, it is indeed a splendid sight as you drive down into the market square from the Gamlingay direction. In short the roundel describes from top left: the Four Manors, the Market Rights of 1094, the Potton Fire of 1783 and the Brewery image. There is a more detailed description on a plaque placed to the right of the panel.

In January 2017 the Four Manors section was started by members of Aragon Housing's Jakes Court, who began work on the river and railway running around the outer perimeter. Then the Potton Federation School was able to become involved and eventually took over. Pupils from the school worked in Mrs. Topple's art room on Wednesday mornings and finally completed the work early May, ready for the mosaic artist Oliver Budd to take it back to his studio and embed it with the other three sections. which he had been making.

It's worth spending some time in front of the mosaic as there are lots of little details as well as a creative use of the mosaic tiles.



Have you seen the large jug with beer bubbling over, the Four Manor name labels resembling bronze plaques, the hams hanging in the market place and the flames of the Fire?

The plaques for each mosaic in the project are unique and worth a mention. They were designed for us by Jeffrey Tribe, head of graphic design at Bedford College and were made in Birmingham. They are made of aluminium making them weather and future proof.

You will notice that the plaques have a coloured band around them. That reflects the main colours in the town council logos, so all three towns' plaques are slightly different. The main body of the plaque tells the story you see in the mosaics and most importantly each plaque includes those who took part in the making of the specific mosaic.

Everybody was welcomed and thanked by Angus Macdonald the Chairman of Potton Town Council









Potton Seasonal Market

Markets represent our oldest and most successful form of exchange and Potton was granted its charter during the reign of William II in 1094. From the 12th Century, it enjoyed a flourishing weekly market, which developed into one of the most important in Bedfordshire during Tudor and Stuart times, but declined after the Great Fire of 1783. Four annual horse fairs were also held until only one remained and finally ended in 1932.

Today, quarterly markets are held on the third Saturday of March, June and Sept and on the second Saturday of December, run by a group of volunteers and supported by Potton Town Council. This was in response to interest shown by local residents in the 2009 Potton Town Plan questionnaire. It has never claimed to be, and is not, a Farmers' Market, but the aim is to use local producers and have a breadth of products that try not to replicate what is offered by our much-appreciated Market Square shops.

The stall holders are very loyal and friendly, creating what feels like a community event. Helped along by some live music, the generous hospitality of the Vineyard Church and the liveliness of Party on Potton, the market has become a nice place

to linger, socialise and shop as well as promoting local charities and volunteer groups.

A typical array of stalls would include: chilli products, preserves, artisan breads, a brewery, game and free-range meat, cheese, greengrocer, honey producer, chocolate and sweet makers, cup cakes, bead jewellery, hand-made needlecraft, crocheted and children's clothing, plants, frozen fish, farm produced pies and a hog roast.



Speedwatch in Potton

Speedwatch is a public volunteer operated community speed awareness incentive. It is supervised and coordinated by Bedfordshire Police but all of the actual organisation, planning and standing on the side of the road taking down numbers is a volunteer team activity.



One of the most regular complaints of the public to the town council outside of the planning and development

nightmare is traffic speeding through the town and past our homes

Sadly the police do not have the resource to attend towns like Potton more than once or twice a year on routine speed camera monitoring, Central Beds Council are very slow to invest in other fixed roadside speed indicating and warning signs and therefore in order to increase public awareness Speedwatch is our backstop.

Our presence in itself with our Hi Vis vests clip boards and the mobile speed indicating device SID is a massive deterrent, however with a small team of volunteers we can only get out when we can and understandably many volunteers are most interested in helping out in the roads around their homes.

Anyone can join the speedwatch team, as long as your eyesight is good enough to pass the driving test, you are happy to spend a couple of hours on a police training session and you can offer an hour or so of your time a few times a year.




Potton Wood

Potton Wood covers an area of 85 hectares (211 acres) and is two miles east of the small town of Potton in the county of Bedfordshire, England. It is part of Ampthill Forest and is managed by Forest Enterprise and owned by the Forestry Commission.

Potton Wood has been designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest for its significance as an oak/ash/field maple ancient woodland; its structure and flora are typical of the West Cambridgeshire Boulder Clay woodland group.

Unusual plants in the wood include oxlip (a national rarity at the edge of its European range here), herb paris, bird's nest orchid and nettle-leaved bellflower. There are plants typical of ancient woodland: common bluebell, dog's mercury, yellow archangel, wood millet and wood anemone. Potton Wood has large areas of broadleaved woodland, some dating back to at least 1601, but also had commercially planted, non-native conifers which were removed in 2004 as



to restore the coppiced ancient woodland.

Mammals found in the wood include fallow deer, grey squirrel, red fox, European hare and European mole; there are birds such as common nightingale, common chiffchaff. blackcap, common whitethroat and European turtle dove. and white admiral and purple hairstreak butterflies.

On 18 September 1945, an American B24 Liberator bomber based at 466 Squadron RAAF at Bassingbourn, Cambridgeshire, of Potton Wood. Four men were killed. The place where it fell can still be seen. Read more at www.grahamhague. com/pottonliberator.shtml.
