

A major milestone was reached in the Potton Hall for All project whereby the majority of respondents to the consultation that took place in September and October

supported the proposal that Potton Town Council should seek authorisation from the Minister of Housing, Communities and Local Government for a loan from the Public Works Loan Board to assist with the funding of this important project. Within the Covid guidelines in existence at the time, we were able to put on both the September and December Seasonal markets. Both of them were very well attended despite the inclement December weather. Many thanks to all of you who support these markets which have become so popular that we normally have a waiting list of traders who want to attend.



The Potton Food and Community Gardens are all up and running with significant involvement from members of the public. You can read more about these important projects on pages 17 and 22-23 respectively.



## Budget 2021-2022

This is always a very important time of year for the Council as it is traditionally the period in which the Council agrees its annual budget and precept. The precept is the council tax element, raised by the town council to undertake its functions across the town. The law requires Town/Parish councils to set a precept that is a 'balancing figure' known in legislation as the 'council tax requirement'. The precept should be set to the amount of money required to balance the accounts after deducting 'other estimated income'.

For the financial year 2021/2022 Potton Town Council's 'Precept' will be £345,908. If you live in a Potton Band D property, you will pay an annual charge of £156.03 to Potton Town Council. This is an increase on last year of £17.26 per band D household (12.4%) which is approximately an additional £1.44 per month / 33 pence per week. Of which approximately 25 pence per week (9.3%) is for the purpose of the Potton Hall for



All loan repayments and 8 pence per week (3.1%) for other services).

The town council is committed to providing services and developing facilities that will benefit all members of our community whilst ensuring we achieve best value from our budget. The town council is seeking the approval of the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government to apply for a Public Works Loan Board (PWLB) loan of £500,000 over the borrowing term of 15 years for the part funding of Potton Hall for All project.

Finally, all town Councillors are volunteers and give of their time free to support Town life and make Potton a great place to live. We are fortunate to have a strong community spirit in Potton and we look forward to working together with residents to help to build on this further.

## **New Rector for St Mary's**

Hello everyone. My name is Alex Wheatley and (all being well) from 25th March, I will be the new Rector for the parish churches in Potton, Sutton and Cockayne Hatley! I'm looking forward to joining these communities and residing in Potton. ## **Potton Hall for All**

Potton Hall for All Charity held its virtual AGM on 26th November, where we welcomed two new Trustees, Beverley Hutchinson and Justin Thomas. Our Support Group also welcomed four new volunteers.

We know many things are on hold due to Covid-19 but we must plan for the future now. This new building will be your new hall, your unique space, like no other in town. The new building will host existing groups and also provide a large flexible space for new sports, arts and social activities.

### Funding

Funding for the Potton Hall for All project was given a boost just before Christmas when we raised £288 at the Potton Seasonal Market. We also received a £200 donation from Mulberry Homes (developers of Market Reach). These funds will help us move the project forward by helping us raise awareness, recruit new volunteers and pay for costs such as essential professional fees to help keep the project on track. Community

fundraising has been tough in 2020 with little or no income opportunities for



the project but behind the scenes we are planning larger scale fundraising to grant and charitable trusts in 2021.



Following the public consultation in Autumn 2020, Potton Town Council have now prepared an application to ask the Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) for permission to take the Public Works Board Loan of £500,000 towards the cost of building the hall. This will be submitted later this month with the support of the Potton Hall for All Trustees.

## Kier slaps in second planning application for 100 houses south of Potton just days before Christmas

- Kier re-applies for 100 houses south of Potton.
- Developer seeking to demolish homes on The Paddocks to build an entrance road.
- Consultation now closed but application likely to go to committee.


A controversial proposed housing development is back on the table and this time the developer wants to create vehicle access via a second quiet residential road.


In December 2019, the developer applied for houses in the same location, however serious concerns were raised by residents, councillors and Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) planning officers. The developer was informed of these concerns by CBC and encouraged to withdraw the application, which it then did. Tracey Wye and I opposed the original application and expressed objections to CBC about overdevelopment, access, visual impact and the environment.

At the time, I warned people 'While the number of concerns voiced by CBC is clearly a very positive thing for Potton, residents must be watchful. It is very likely the developer will be back with a revised application in the months to come'. Unfortunately I was right.

In November last year I warned Kier was preparing to re-apply.

The timing of this latest application is interesting. It is an oft-used tactic by developers to put in applications just before Christmas on the basis that fewer people will notice or comment. Four significant planning applications in our ward alone were received by CBC in December. Despite all this, at the time of writing over 700 people have sent objections to the council.





The proposed development would see all construction traffic accessing the site via Sutton Mill Road and, once complete, the 350+ vehicle journeys per day would go in and out via The Ridgeway or The Paddocks and then on to Sutton Mill Road. The development would clearly cause huge disruption to a large part of Potton both in construction and once completed.

On the map above, one can see a barrier half way through the new development meaning traffic would not be able to drive all the way through the estate. In the documents, Kier acknowledges the change of access and says 55 houses would be accessed from The Ridgeway and 42 from The Paddocks, splitting the development into two halves with only pedestrian/cycle access between them.

What's more, the map on the left shows the western access will exit via The Paddocks straight over an area of land where there are currently homes owned by a housing association called Stonewater. Tracey Wye and I have opposed the application and if - as seems likely - CBC are prepared to approve it, it will go to a committee of councillors to make the final decision.

Wellbeing freebies – there are still a few wellbeing items to give away. If you would benefit from a jar opener, disabled toilet key, personal safety alarm or purse bells, please contact Andrea who can social distance deliver.

**Benefits help –** if you need support completing forms such as Attendance Allowance, Blue Parking Badge, Carer's Allowance, Pension Credit or Council Tax Reduction/Housing Benefit, please get in touch. Andrea can advise you and help you complete these forms if you are unsure doing it yourself. Social distance guidelines apply.

**Gas and Electricity emergencies –** be prepared for winter. In the event of a powercut, dial 105 for information. In a gas emergency dial 0800 111 999. **Are You Eligible for Pension Credit?** If your weekly income is below £173.25 (single person) or £265.20 (couple) then contact Andrea and she will help you to apply for Pension Credit. You may also be eligible for a rebate on your energy bill, help with NHS costs, and a free TV licence, so it is worth applying even if your income is only just below the threshold.

**Foodbank parcels –** if you are struggling to keep yourself fed properly due to a temporary change in your income, COVID related or not, Andrea can refer you in confidence for a foodbank parcel.

Thursday Friendship Group & Tablet Workshops - unfortunately both of these groups are on hold until further notice, but they will resume when guidelines allow.

## Veg Box Donation Scheme faith • food • community

The culmination of our first seven months as a charity was a collaborative effort between the Veg Box Donation Scheme, The Royal Oak Potton, and the Potton Community Support Group. The Royal Oak had been setting aside £1 for every Sunday and Christmas Day takeaway lunch order, and the funds were used to purchase the ingredients for a Christmas dinner hamper for local Potton families facing food poverty, which we distributed to those on our lists.

This first year for the Veg Box Donation Scheme has been a time of establishment as a Christian charity based in Potton, laying the foundations for expansion into other areas. We have been working with local food banks and other referral agencies to provide a nutritious diet for households in need in Potton and latterly in Biggleswade as well.

Donations of fresh fruit and vegetables have come from many sources, mainly from the allotments and home growers in the summer, but as winter drew on the donations from shoppers and local schools and supermarkets increased, to enable us to continue to provide veg boxes to those who need them the most.

- ongoing donations of fruit and vegetables, which can be left on the Veg Box Donation Scheme table at the Potton Town Council allotments in Everton Road on Saturdays from 09:00-12:00, or call me to collect or provide another donation point;
- volunteers to help pack and distribute the veg boxes;
- monetary donations so that we can purchase produce when needed;
- volunteer Management Committee members, if you share our Christian ethos and feel you could contribute to our vision to help those in need.

The plants have now started to establish and we will be looking to do more in the next year as and when restrictions and time allows. Transforming the pathways will take time, but with such a great community spirit it can only get better.

For now, we have just focused around the King Street to Carters Lane area, but our aspiration is for residents living along the route from Chapman Close all the way through to King Street getting involved in time, to brighten the whole pathway and make it their own. By the time you read this, we will already be planning our next moves. We very much want to see this as a Communityled project supported by Potton Town Council's Environmental Committee.
