### **Remembrance Sunday 2021**

This year Remembrance Sunday falls on Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> November and the town will meet as usual on the Market Square at 10.15am for the Service led by the United Churches of Potton, before forming a parade to march to the Cemetery and War Memorial along Sandy Road where the 11.00am silence will be held followed by the reading of the Roll of Honour.

At our last parade in 2019, we were privileged and pleased to have two serving members of our armed forces taking part in full dress uniform, a feature which helped to involve the more junior members of our community who took part. The parade is led by out in the following order - Salvation Army Band / Clergy and Church Leaders / Flag Bearer(s) / Deputy Lieutenant / Potton Town Council / Ex-Service Men and Women / Guides, Brownies and Rainbows / Scouts, Cubs and Beavers / Schools and Pre-schools / Members of the Public / The Fire Service.









Everyone is welcome to join the parade and we would be especially pleased if there are any additional serving members of the armed services who would join the parade and form up around our exservice men and women. Please contact the Town Council for further details or indeed just turn up on the day and make yourself known.

For those unable to travel to the cemetery there will be refreshments served and provided by the St Mary's Church congregation volunteers in the Community Centre where the 11.00am BBC service from Whitehall will be screened. Refreshments will also be served for those in the returning parade from the Cemetery.

### September

After a long two-year wait, we were able to take our first steps to our 'new normal' at the long-awaited **47<sup>th</sup> Annual Potton Show** on a gloriously sunny Saturday. Over 1,500 people attended on **11<sup>th</sup> September**, visiting the show tent to see the exhibits and prize-winning entries as well as the many stalls in St Mary's Church Field. I'd like to thank the Potton Show Committee, and everyone involved in making this such a successful event. See more on page 22.

Thanks also go to **Potton Hall for All** for organising a very enjoyable **quiz night** in the show tent, ably hosted by Justin Thomas. We all had a great evening, although my team didn't win.

The Potton Neighbourhood Plan identified issues of **shoppers finding it difficult to park in the Market Square** and proposed a solution of facilitating access to the Brook End car park by making the exit to Brook End two-way, reverting to its former state prior to the Market Square renovation some years ago.



Following this trial, the town council was consulted, and at its meeting on on **7<sup>th</sup> September** voted to support the proposals put forward by Central Bedfordshire Council.

As you will probably have seen, residents of Sutton Mill Road have converted the grass verges into the **Busy Bee Community Garden**, producing a colourful kerbside garden. Following this, on **9<sup>th</sup> September** we received a formal 'licence to plant' from CBC thus validating the good work.

### Your newly co-opted Town Councillor

#### **Councillor Dan Norman**



I have lived in Potton with my wife Ruth since 1985. All three of our children attended Potton and Sandy schools and two of them went on to University. My wife is a regular volunteer at St. John's, Moggerhanger.

I retired from working with three of the major construction companies after 40 years in 2001.

Following my involvement with a Potton Town Council sub-committee developing the Neighbourhood Plan since 2016, I found it interesting that a small market town should produce such an important document so quickly and professionally. Involving the town's population in its production was a way to meet a

number of interested people, too.

I had some experience of council work when we lived in Shropshire, so I was happy to think that I could put some of my experience to help the people of Potton and I look forward to meeting more of them in my new role as a member of this Council.

### What do Town Councillors do?

Town councillors have three main areas of work:

- Decision-making: through attending meetings and committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.
- 2. Monitoring: councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
- **3.** Getting involved locally: as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. This often depends on what the

councillor wants to achieve and how much time they have available.

### How much time does it take?

Councillors spend on average about three hours a week on council work. Obviously, there are some town councillors who spend more time than this – and some less, but in the main, being a town councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

# Do Potton Town Councillors get paid?

Working as a Town Councillor is a completely voluntary role.

### Get to know your Town Councillors

#### **Councillor Andy Gibb**



I'm a newcomer to Potton having only lived here since 2001, but was born many years ago just over the border in Pirton, Hertfordshire. My interests include cycling, allotment gardening, the natural world and climbing mountains in Scotland whenever I can get away. I work for Anglian Water and live in Bull Street and have two children who went through both the Potton schools.

### **Christmas Lights Switch-On 2021**

This year we have obtained permission to close off the whole of the Market Square which will enable us to provide an enhanced layout with better visibility for the ever increasing numbers of people attending the event. The Christmas Lights event will begin at 3.30pm with a Christmas Craft Fair, which will include the usual stalls from Potton groups and organisations, together with Henry Harris' fairground rides and other entertainment on the stage in the Market Square. The Switch-On will take place on Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> November (Time to be confirmed) and entertainment will continue until 7pm.

### Welcome Back Fund

Central Bedfordshire Council invited the town council to submit a bid for Welcome Back Funding. The grant money has been released by the UK Government as part of their roadmap out of lockdown specifically to support the revival of local town centre shopping areas post Covid-19 restrictions. Central Bedfordshire Council allocated the town council £6,000 and it is to be spent by 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022.

Spending the grant funds has already started and by the time you read this, we have ordered Christmas Lights for the town centre to support the festive season. In the August edition of the newsletter Potton Town Council encouraged you to shop local and support your local traders.

It is important for everyone to continue shopping locally and safely to get the best out of what our Town Centre offers residents. It isn't only a place to shop, it's a place to gather, meet with friends and family and enjoy leisure opportunities like eating out.

### **Your Local Environment**

In this edition of updates about your local environment, while we continue to chase the mowing contractor who still neglects areas of the town, we have also received complaints of a mystery contractor applying herbicide this summer. Whilst we try to go herbicide free, in this edition we update you on our dialogue with CBC who seem unaware of awarding such a contract. We also announce the formation of new community group to the Potton Paths Garden groups and report on the recent work of the Busy Bees and Meeting Lane groups.

### **Potton Paths Garden Groups**

#### **Busy Bees**

While the plants become established and look increasingly impressive there was a scare for the group when Kier/Tilia Homes surreptitiously asked CBC Highways to order removal of the plants to build a lay-by that aids vehicle access for the refused Ridgeway development. Quick action from CBC Cllr Adam Zerny was able to avert disaster. A retrospective application to CBC for permission to plant the verge was quickly approved and highways asked to be aware of any similar future attempts.



The group will be carrying out more planting over the coming months leading up to Christmas and this will help bulk the bed up to suppress any weeds that might grow.

#### **Meeting Lane**



In September, a small group of residents continued tidying and selectively removing unwanted plants from the stretch between King Street and the junction of Carters Lane. It was a lovely sunny morning for a pleasurable few hours getting stuck in and the groups young wildlife and litter picking champion also managed to find a lime hawkmoth caterpillar looking to find somewhere to pupate.

As with the Busy Bees, more planting is planned for the Meeting Lane later in the year.

### The Pegnuts Author: Cllr Lindsay Kitchener

A working group from Sheepwalk Close and Yew Tree Close – calling themselves The Pegnuts - tackled the nettles and brambles on the banks of Potton Brook over two weekends this September. It required a team effort to cut through thick briars and clear debris from the brook.

The intention is to maintain a healthy habitat for water voles and other riverside mammals and gradually reduce nettle cover over the next couple of years to make way instead for native wildflowers and lush tussocky grasses to flourish.

### **Pesticides in Potton**



Readers may recall an article last spring asking if Potton can go pesticide free. This coincided with the town council taking the decision to ban the use of herbicides in the town, informing CBC that contractors use alternative methods.

Glyphosate is the most commonly used herbicide by commercial landscapers. There is increasing concern over its effects on people and the environment. The Pesticide Action Network UK (PANUK) website www.pan-uk.org explains in detail the health and environmental risks. The organisation runs several campaigns, one in particular is against use of glyphosate in towns. However, as found that sends an email to our ward councillors who already fully support a ban in the town. The organisation Wild Justice are also attempting to tackle the problem. challenging local authorities on their often illegal use of glyphosate: https:// wildjustice.org.uk/general/glyphosateuse-by-local-authorities/

CBC continue sending contractors to apply glyphosate, despite our request alternatives be used. They

justify its use as being an approved substance, used by fully trained operatives and is harmless to people, pets and wildlife. Observant residents have reported seeing operatives and expressed concerns directly to the town council and CBC. Each time the town council or a resident receives a response from CBC its content is guite worrying, ranging from they were 'cleaning the play area paths' to it was 'Potton Town Council contractors carrying out the work'. Despite on-going enquiries, CBC are unable to tell us who is undertaking the work and if it's under one of their contracts. It is a requirement for a contractor to record and submit to their employer (in this case CBC) who has sprayed what, where, when, why and at what dose. CBC should be able to refer to those records and identify who the contractor is. Regardless, they should know what contracts they award to which company to do what, where and when, whether its painting lines in the road or spraying herbicide.

This summer, residents have reported a quad bike rider applying herbicide, spraying more parked cars than anything else. According to Health and Safety Executive, driving a quad bike while spraying is not permitted. Our experiences have been shared with Wild Justice as we continue trying to establish who the *Phantom Sprayer of Old Potton Town* is. When CBC finally decide to admit they have awarded contracts to apply herbicide in Potton, we will again ask that they respect our request for the use of alternative methods.

### **Potton Speedwatch**

Potton Speedwatch resumed their activities following the easing of Covid restrictions and have been out and about around the hotspots of the town again this Summer and Autumn.

The group is totally manned by volunteers who give an hour or so typically once a month to go out with their speed monitoring device. After Covid the numbers of volunteers has dropped and once again they are looking for like-minded volunteers who would consider getting involved.

The team is also now looking for a new coordinator to liaise with the police, organise sessions and manage the volunteers. If you feel you could help, please do not hesitate to contact Potton Town Council by emailing **pottoncouncil@btconnect.com** and we will get back to you.

#### Results during our last series of sessions:

Gamlingay Road - from a total of 190 cars passing in a one hour period, 36 were reported for travelling 5 mph or more over the 30 mph speed limit. These included a large articulated lorry travelling at 46 mph, 14 cars travelling in excess of 40 mph and one car at 56 mph. All of these vehicles had clear sight of the device and hi-vis clad volunteers. If they were only paying attention to the road ahead.

The above results are typical of traffic on the main arterial roads into and out of town and unfortunately the other roads are not very much better.
