Chairman's message

Potential Housing Development on Sandy Road

At the town council meeting on the 3rd January 2023 town council met with a developer who outlined their plans to build up to 178 homes. The councillors at the meeting made it clear any prospective application is not supported under the Neighbourhood Plan as stated on pages 17 and 18 of Annex A Site Assessments www.pottontowncouncil. co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2022/03/ Potton-NP-Annex-A-Site-Assessments-Version-3.pdf. Potton Town Council Elections 2023

In May 2023 a local election of all 15 places on Potton Town Council will take place. Potton Town Councillors will come to the end of their four-year term and will either re-stand for election or step down. So, there is an opportunity to become a Councillor and contribute to your community. Should there be more than 15 residents wishing to stand as a Councillor, then an election will be held. If 15 or fewer people come forward, they will automatically be 'elected' with no voting taking place.

Initially, a Councillor may have little knowledge of Council work but this will come, along with experience and confidence. As a new Councillor you will bring to the Council fresh enthusiasm, new ideas, a care for your community and a willingness to learn.

A candidate for the Town Council is qualified if at the time of nomination they are:

- A British subject or Irish citizen
- 18 years of age
- Either on the list of electors for the town or during the last twelve months you have:
 - occupied land or property in Potton as owner or tenant
 - had your principle place of work here
 - lived in, or within three miles of Potton.

A town Councillor is unpaid and gives their time for free to the community on a voluntary basis. The role of a councillor is to bring local issues to the attention of the council and help it make decisions on behalf of the local community.

Potton Town Councillors, on taking office, agree to abide by the town council's adopted code of conduct which is consistent with the Nolan principles of;

- Selflessness
 Openness
- Integrity
- Objectivity Leadership

Honesty

Accountability

The diversity of the town council is its strength. Diversity often arises because councillors have different backgrounds, enthusiasms and interests. Councillors have different skills and attitudes; for example, some work with ideas while others are very practical; some like accounts while others prefer reports. The town council needs a range of skills to work as a team.

For anyone interested in standing as a town councillor, nomination papers will be available from the Town Council office from 1st March and will also be available from Central Bedfordshire Council, Priory House, Monks Walk, Chicksands SG17 5TQ.

Nomination papers need to be returned by hand to Central Bedfordshire Council at the above address, between 14th March and 4pm on 4th April.

Budget 2023-2024

This is always a very important time of year for the Council as it is traditionally the period in which the Council agrees its annual budget and precept. The precept is the council tax element, raised by the town council to undertake its functions across the town. The law requires Town/ Parish councils to set a precept that is a 'balancing figure' known in legislation as the 'council tax requirement'. The precept should be set to the amount of money required to balance the accounts after deducting 'other estimated income'.

For the financial year 2023-2024, Potton Town Council's 'Precept' will be £368,620. If you live in a Potton Band D property, you will pay an annual



charge of £159.30 to Potton Town Council. This remains the same as 2022-2023.

The town council are volunteers and give of their time free to support Town life and make Potton a great place to live. We are fortunate to have a strong community spirit in Potton and we look forward to working together with residents to help to build on this further.

Potton's Christmas Lights

The Christmas Lights Switch-on event has been a major annual feature of Potton's busy calendar of community activities since its inception.

Back in the early 1980's, Potton Christmas lights consisted of a string of lights around the library with 'Merry Xmas' in polystyrene. Cllr John Hobbs and local electrician Tony Joel decided to improve things, so they collected donations from local businesses and set about adding strings of lights to the trees and to buildings around the Market Square. This was carried out by a team of volunteers using ladders where required. Eventually, the display was good enough to have an official switch-on, so Judi Hobbs set about making this happen.

In the late 1990's the Town Council agreed to pick up the baton to deliver the Christmas Lights for the town with the help of Carol and Alan Leggatt who have been involved now for over 20 years. This enabled the establishment of a dedicated Christmas Lights Committee who were briefed to identify ways of upgrading and improving the displays. This has been achieved gradually over many years using annual grants from Potton Consolidated Charity, donations from the public via collection buckets in many of the town's shops and hostelries and a modest



budget from the town council. All our lights are now super-efficient and robust LEDs. There have been additions to the display nearly every year, this year we had new lanterns on the lamp columns and large motifs of a Christmas Pudding and Father Christmas which were designed by Potton children.

Installation and taking down of the displays is still undertaken by volunteers who do not receive any payment other than a sausage sandwich and a couple of drinks at the end of the day in recognition of their unwavering support. Special mention needs to be given to Deepdale Trees who provide our wonderful Christmas tree and the industrial machinery that enables us to guickly put up the festoons at no cost.

Given the above, the ongoing costs of putting on our display is kept to a minimum, saving many thousands of pounds each year.





Update from Central Bedfordshire Councillors Adam Zerny and Tracey Wye

Developer planning to build 180 houses next to Potton



Developers are once again plotting to build houses in the fields between Potton and Deepdale. No application has yet been received by Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) but the developer attended a Potton Town Council meeting in January and made its intentions clear.

In February 2017, CBC received a planning application for a huge 186 house estate to be built on the north side of Sandy Road, Potton, filling much of the gap between the town and Deepdale. It received more than 130 objections and was eventually withdrawn in July 2018.

While the reasons for the applicant withdrawing were not made public, it is often the case that they are withdrawn after the council has told the applicant they will be refused.

Since then CBC has approved a Local Plan for development which runs until 2035 and this site is not on the list. Neither is it part of the town's Neighbourhood Plan. In theory this makes it unlikely a development would be welcomed by CBC but with planning, nothing is certain. And none of this stops a developer putting in a speculative planning application.

The developer attended the January Potton Town Council meeting and spent 20 minutes outlining its plans. They sounded much like the ones proposed back in 2017. Despite plenty of pledges about what they would do for the local environment it was clear they were promising only to fulfil their legal planning obligations. The developer provided the town council with these maps.

A number of town councillors made it clear any prospective application in this location would be unlikely to be supported by the town council.

As soon as an application is received by CBC, Cllr Tracey Wye and I will make this public and at that point you will get the opportunity to comment.

Potton has had significant development in recent years and we will strongly oppose a development of this size in our area.

Reporting Pot Holes

This winter has seen a dramatic deterioration of our roads with some deep potholes opening up around town. And things are just as bad across the county.

The snow and frost before Christmas started the erosion just when many highways officers took time off for the holiday. This left the roads vulnerable to water getting in the cracks and holes and the rain in the new year has made things worse. While some roads remain in a poor condition I have been successful in getting some of the worst holes filled as urgent jobs.

Community Safety

The safety of Potton residents and visitors is important to all. This is why a 20mph zone has been put in place for roads leading into the centre of Potton. This speed certainly feels slow – and it is. However, it is also a safer speed than (say) 30mph. It certainly saved the life of a child who ran out in front of me some time ago. I was able to stop in time.

It is estimated that car accidents occur 40% less often at 20mph than at 30mph (approx. 5% reduction for every 1mph). However, in addition to preventing accidents, reduced speed also reduces the potential for injury or death. There is a 20% chance of killing someone if you hit them while travelling at 30 mph. Therefore, it is very important to observe the lower speed limit! Of course, careless or dangerous driving can be reported to police (https://www. beds.police.uk/tua/tell-us-about/soh/ seen-or-heard/) or CrimeStoppers (https://crimestoppers-uk.org/giveinformation/forms/give-informationanonymously)

Finally, I thank residents for their concern for my health at seeing me wandering around with cans and wrappers of potentially unhealthy repasts. I would reassure everyone that these really aren't mine. They had been discarded carelessly by others who don't appear capable of finding waste bins, although these are usually within easy reach. On a serious note, discarding waste on our streets and parks can be dangerous to our pets and wild-life and attracts vermin (e.g. rats) – so please use the bins provided.

Refugee Response Potton Group

In a previous newsletter, we reported that a cross-community group - Ukraine Response Potton (URP) - had been formed to help support evacuees arriving in Potton from war-torn Ukraine and their hosts. More recently, a family from Myanmar has joined our community. They are supported primarily through a partnership with CBC and the King's Arms Project. The URP has also offered local assistance to this family and as a result, they have changed their name to the Refugee Response Potton (RRP) to reflect their objective to assist all refugees that shelter or settle in Potton.

The RRP offers support with integration into the Potton community. It helps to have a friendly contact when navigating through bureaucracy and issues that arise with day to day living in a new country. This is especially the case when families have been uprooted from their country unexpectedly with little or no time to organise or plan.

The initial intense period of settling in – learning English, transport, registering with different organisations and joining the library – all takes time and gradually things start to fall into place, confidence builds resulting in greater independence.

In December a small festive gathering was held to welcome our new arrivals as well as our more established Ukrainian guests, their hosts and all who are involved with supporting the families.



It has been very humbling to witness the willingness of our new guests to contribute to our community. In addition, the very positive response from Potton residents and local businesses reinforces our reputation as a friendly town.

Veg Box Donation Scheme (VBDS)



The VBDS recently used the Mill Lane Pavilion to pack their Christmas Day Meal boxes. With the funding they had received (a £500 grant from Sainsbury's, two other personal donations of

£100, and a large donation from Deepdale Trees in Potton) they were able to provide a Christmas Day Meal box for 77 people. The box contained a turkey roast for each family, as well as all the ingredients for a Christmas breakfast and dinner. MyFresh Prepared provided us with presents for the children from their Secret Santa collection.

The recipients included a homeless man in temporary accommodation, a family living in a hostel in Sandy, a few families with disabled or autistic children, and many other households in financial need.

The VBDS had 13 volunteers (including three children and two teenagers who enjoyed it immensely) helping them pack and deliver the Christmas boxes in Potton, Gamlingay, Sandy and Biggleswade.
