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Chairman's message

Hello and welcome to the October 2023 edition of the Town Council quarterly newsletter.

Farewell to summer!

So, Summer has come to an end with many events taking place since the July newsletter. Before we look at the events of the past three months, I have to highlight my and others disappointment at the number of instances of antisocial behaviour (ASB) that have occurred. Potton is a lovely place to live and I'm sure all the residents would like it to stay that way, however the crime rate is low compared to other towns in the area. To keep it that way it falls to all residents to report any instances of ASB they see to the nonemergency number (101), we can and should act as extra "eyes and ears" for the authorities as it is to our advantage.

The way the systems works is that the more independent reports (don't reuse crime/report numbers) that are accumulated the more the area comes to notice as somewhere action is required regarding such things as specific ASB and petty crime. Please also raise these to the town council Community Safety Working Group who have planned meetings with our local police officer and Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) Community Support Officer where these issues are discussed. If you see either of them around do speak to them and raise any concerns you have; the more aware they are of the local community's feelings and concerns the better.

On a more upbeat theme it's good to see that all the efforts of those volunteers involved with the Potton Green Wheel have come to fruition. I had the privilege along with Cllr John Hobbs of cutting the ribbon to "open" the wheel at the golf course/pegnut wood bridge. Over 50 people came along and then continued on the two guided Wheel walks which finished at the reopened Boundary Café, to whom we wish success!

We have also had Potton Apple day, an annual event enjoyed and attended by many, complete with tea and cakes from the Potton Hall for All group, and cider and apple juice from the Community Orchard. Well done and thanks to all involved **(see page 9 for more information).**

The next event in Potton's calendar is the Remembrance Sunday Service and Parade on 12th November which I anticipate will be well attended as usual. Part of Potton's Neighbourhood Plan vision is to promote renewable energy and carbon reduction for the benefit of all. From past conversations with residents, we know there is a desire for a more "green" environment as evidenced by the support for initiatives such as the green wheel and sustainable transport, admittedly a challenge in our rural area. As a result of work undertaken by the Town Council Community Energy Working Group, we are very excited to have won the opportunity for residents to participate in the CBC collaboration with Community Energy South.

If residents are interested, the collaborative project will strive towards bringing the community to Net Zero. This is a clear win for everyone - whether you're in need of sustainable energy generation or retrofitting insulation to reduce energy need; or wishing to benefit from help with fuel poverty or to invest in community energy projects. However, this chance is lost if residents don't come forward as ultimately this needs to be a volunteer and non-council led initiative. All project is moving along. The contractor selected has provided a price that's within our agreed cost envelope and the final funding should all be in place in the near future. A Quantity Surveyor has been appointed to make sure that the contractor delivers what has been agreed.

We have received a favourable response from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) that allows us to apply for the loan, a key piece of the jigsaw. I can assure you the town council will ensure any loan will minimised through careful financial management and forward budgeting. **Find out more on pages 20 and 21.**

We would hope to commence work late Autumn and finish in Spring next year.

And finally ...

Last but not least, as a result of a request by residents, Royal Mail were asked if further post boxes could be provided in areas where the facility for posting a letter didn't exist for those who found it difficult to access those situated in town. Thankfully Royal Mail came up trumps and agreed to supply two more of these; one situated on Biggleswade Road between Hutchinson Rise and Blane Place. and the other on Everton Road opposite Goodship Lane. From my experience many of the older generation appreciate a handwritten letter as it's felt to be a more personal form of communication, which it would be a shame to lose.

This summer readers will have noticed some floral colour in Henry Smith Playing Fields, Mill Lane Recreation Ground and Sandy Road Cemetery, as reported in previous editions of the newsletter. We will seek opportunities to enhance other areas in due course.



Since May, the Town Council's Environment Committee comprises Chairman Cllr Gibb. Vice-Chairman Cllr Day and also Cllrs Craig and Fox. Additionally, Cllr Wye and three members of the community, Rebecca Beattie, Jill White and Sally Wileman, have been co-opted to the committee.

At the community orchard, volunteers have been busy managing the trees and wildflower meadow, and this year have been able to harvest its first fruits. The open space has yet to be handed over to the town council and, until such time, management is not the responsibility of the town council. but that of the developer Tilia Homes. The town council has been pursuing the developer to resolve the matter and to date this has proven inconclusive.



Until this happens, the town council is unable to manage the site and provide additional facilities such as litter and dog waste bins. Until then, we request you please clear up after your dog and place the waste in your bins.

With Swifts continuing to decline - the latest figure being -62% since 1995 - it was pleasing this year to see at least four pairs now using nest boxes beneath the clock tower in the Market Square, Away from the town, a small colony is also establishing itself around Newtown.

The Green Wheel is clearly signposted together with QR codes providing points of interest via our PTC website.




Hopefully, you will enjoy walking the Wheel as much as those who walked the route at the launch.



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Thermal Image Cameras





With Winter approaching, do you want to find out where your home is leaking heat?

Potton Town Council has two thermal image cameras (one iOS and one Android with lightning adaptors) which can plug into your smartphone for loan to Potton residents. There is no charge to borrow a camera; you just need to pay a £200 deposit, which is refundable after the camera has been returned, and you might consider making a donation to allow for maintenance of the cameras and/or additional cameras to be purchased. Update from Central Bedfordshire Councillor Tracey Wye

This summer has been a busy time getting to grips with my new role on the executive at Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC), as well as keeping up with issues closer to home in Potton and the surrounding villages.

I have been blessed with an amazing opportunity to take the lead on Sustainability and Climate Resilience at this critical moment in human history, to be part of the change we need to tackle the causes of climate change, adapt to the challenges it brings, and help nature recover. I want to ensure the council can empower you to make a difference and get involved in taking action too.

One of the first events I attended as an executive member was an award ceremony where CBC was recognised for the Carbon Literacy training programme it carried out for staff and councillors.

This course helped us understand the importance of reducing carbon emissions and encouraged us to commit to action. During my training session in February, I pledged to start a bus users forum to see how to boost public transport for this area. Little did I know at the time I would soon be in a position to try and improve transport for the whole county, not just the buses but our walking and cycling routes as well.

The award night was a timely reminder that all the small actions we can take, such as walking or cycling short journeys, installing solar panels, or planting a tree, add up to significant change for the planet.



And it was inspiring to learn more about how other councils, organisations and companies from around the world are training their people and taking action as they joined the ceremony online.

Community Energy in and around Potton Author: Cllr Charles Craig



Residents of Potton and the surrounding area are in a great position to benefit from the government's push towards 'Net Zero' (i.e. the balancing of local energy requirement with local 'sustainable energy' production such that there is a net zero need for fossil-fuel mediated energy production).

Communities have been identified as best placed to match together local expertise and resource with local needs and thereby to drive reduced local emissions of harmful gases. Communities are also great vehicles for education. In fact, an independent statutory body, the Climate Change Committee, has suggested that community actions will be essential to meet energy targets. More than half of the emissions cuts needed by the UK, rely on people and local businesses making low-carbon-positive decisions at a local and individual level.

The challenge for a local area seems daunting at the start. An independent think tank, the Green Alliance, has estimated that local government funding is good for only 25-35% of their 'Net Zero' pledges. However, looking across England, there are examples of villages that have independently met net zero some years ago and are enjoying the fruits of fossil-fuel free energy and heat. So Net Zero is very achievable by communities, with dividends for everyone – both the possibility of cheaper energy and of being paid for electricity generation (yes, reasonable tariffs are said to be coming back, but it might be possible to 'charge at source' in some instances). In addition, there is now a government strategy (for strategy read 'money') committing it to enable local areas to deliver net zero.

As part of the national effort, Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) has set up a collaboration with Community Energy South (CES). The collaboration is called the Community Energy Pathways Programme and it is supporting five communities in the CBC area. Community Energy South is a group of highly motivated people that set up 10 years ago, so there is a wealth of experience available on what works so rapid progress should be possible. They specialise in encouraging the growth of community-led projects and development of project pipelines, including community-owned and grantfunded projects. They also support networking of community energy groups through mentoring and training as well as providing tools and resources.

Potton has won one of the five places and we have been working with Potton residents and are now engaging with Potton ward parishes, Biggleswade, Sandy and Moggerhanger residents (others may apply!) to extend the reach of the Potton group and identify residents with the enthusiasm and needs to make our programme more likely to succeed.

COMMUNITY ENERGY SOUTH

Pathways to Net Zero with Community Energy

There are two aspects to achieving net zero – 'powering up' and 'powering down'. Powering up includes community-owned renewable energy generation, community heat networks, retrofitting generation potential and electric vehicle charging.

Powering down includes retrofitting insulation and other energy efficiency measures, increasing energy awareness and advising on how greater efficiency can be achieved and supporting people through fuel poverty. As a side effect, it is hoped this will help build social cohesiveness, responsibility and enable community and individual resilience. The Potton Town Council Community Energy working group is not the body that will provide this service – the 'service' is more of a 'community self-service' and will be provided by you the resident reading this, and you will determine whether you will benefit from the initiative. The eventual community energy group will be established as a resident-led group.

If you are interested in helping the group, or in contributing to our technical, business, legal or accounting needs, please contact Potton Town Council, who champion these early activities.

Community Safety

Our SpeedWatch volunteers continue to help educate drivers on roads in Potton keep to the local speed limit of 20 mph throughout the town.



There are, of course, places for additional volunteers to help out – the more we have the greater our coverage (just contact a councillor, the council offices or go online to **www.beds.police.uk/ watchschemes** where you can find out more and register if you wish). Speedwatch teams will also be pleased to speak with you at the roadside.

Another way everyone can help is by recognising that 20 mph is the speed limit (i.e. the maximum legally permitted speed) not a target. They can then easily remain within the speed limit without the need to focus on the speedo – just go more slowly. The additional benefit is that other drivers will then note the behaviours and, over time, our high rates of drivers who drive in excess of the speed limit, will reduce. A common thought for some drivers is that my driving 'is fine' – I think that argument works until it's not fine and then it's too late as damage is done and people are injured or worse. The reason for the speed limit is that it reduces crash rates relative to 30 mph by 50% in town. Another way to look at it is that cars driving in town at speeds of 30 mph relative to 20 mph doubles your chances of coming home to hear of a family member being involved in a crash and more than doubles the chance that a family member is seriously hurt as a result.

Finally, please keep within the speed limit – for everyone's safety. In addition, consider if you have the inclination and any spare time (a lot or a little) to help with our local SpeedWatch.

Potton Hall for All Moves a Step Closer!

Registered Charity number 1158751

We are delighted to tell you that building the hall is likely to start this autumn for completion in early summer next year. As you will have previously read the new design (Ref: CBC/23/01177/ FULL) received planning approval in July 2023. Although the total exterior building area will be smaller than originally planned, it will still contain the biggest main hall space available for hire in Potton and is able to host all the activities that residents wanted us to accommodate.

The main hall space is slightly bigger than that at the Gamlingay Eco-Hub. The plans can be viewed on CBC planning portal using the above reference number. The start of the building work was dependent on meeting an end of August 2023 deadline set by Central Bedfordshire Council, that Potton Hall for All Charity and Potton Town Council could show that the hall design (with planning permission) can be built for the money already promised to the building. We met this deadline and have formally asked Central Bedfordshire to confirm the release of the Section 106 money to Potton Town Council for use in this project.





Potton Town Council have also submitted the request to the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities to confirm the borrowing approval for the Ioan from the Public Works Loan Board. Potton residents gave the Town Council agreement to take this Ioan in the consultation of 2020. Potton Town Council intends to take a Ioan which will not require a rise in the Council Tax residents are paying.

Once these two pieces of the funding are confirmed, we will be able to sign the contract with Watson and Cox, our contractor, and they will be able to start building.




We will also call in pledges made by three charitable trusts to add to the funds already secured by the charity and Potton Town Council. Building on site could be as early as the end of October 2023 with the hall completed by June 2024.

It has taken us a long time to get to this point, but we are delighted that we are now in this position.
